Welcome to *In Touch* – the magazine of Cheltenham United Reformed Church.

Cheltenham United Reformed Church is a joint Pastorate of the 3 United Reformed Churches in Cheltenham. This means that they share a Minister – Revd Maz Allen – and indeed they work very closely together in all respects. New readers, who may also be new to the area, can be assured of a warm welcome at all 3 Churches:-

St Andrew's United Reformed Church is situated in Cheltenham town centre. It is a former Presbyterian Church built in 1885. Recent renovations have retained its essential character whilst at the same time delivering an impressive facility meeting the needs of the 21st Century. Current membership is around the 100 mark.

Prestbury United Reformed Church serves the village of Prestbury to the north of Cheltenham. It is a former Congregational Chapel built in 1866. Current membership is around the 20 mark. Services are normally held at Prestbury on only the 1st, 3rd and 4th Sundays of each month.

The Church in Warden Hill is a Local Ecumenical Partnership (LEP) between the Anglican and URC communities serving the large residential districts of Hatherley and Warden Hill to the south of Cheltenham. Sunday morning services currently alternate between St Christopher's and the URC Centre with a typical congregation of 85. Ministry is shared between the URC Minister (Revd Maz Allen) and members of the Anglican South Cheltenham Team Ministry of whom the Revd Jacqui Hyde has particular responsibility for The Church in Warden Hill. The Church in Warden Hill has its own church magazine – *The Lantern* – but its activities and events are also publicised in this *In Touch* magazine.

The website of the Cheltenham United Reformed Church (www.urcic.org.uk) and the website of The Church in Warden Hill (www.tciwh.org.uk) are further sources of information about the churches.

Dear Friends,

With the weather supposedly getting warmer, we turn our attention to holidays, Spring and new life in our gardens. This promise of birth, new growth and well-being lifts our spirits from the memory of winter.

The early Church would have been in the throws of heightened expectation following Jesus' appearances after his resurrection. His followers would have been waiting for Jesus' return as though the horrors of the cross were but a dream. How long did it take – how many generations – before expectation turned to disappointment, turned to understanding, turned to joyous anticipation of a new life beyond death?

What bombardment of emotions did the early Church live through and can we say today that our own rollercoaster faith-journey is any different?

We (in and of the world) fail miserably at living peaceably with our fellow humans if we do not have Christ at our centre. Those early Christians would have struggled long and hard, before realising that Christ didn't need to physically walk with them, he just needed to live in their hearts.

This month, as we straddle the seasons of Easter and Pentecost, let us do a little Spring-cleaning within ourselves to bring forth new life!



Birds, Lancaster Pilot, and Maggie

Titles can be suggestive can't they, without really telling you anything? For example, in 1871, the artist James Whistler produced a painting called "Arrangement in Grey and Black No. 1". See what I mean? All that tells us is that there's a lot of grey and black about. You need to go and have look at the picture to see what it is. Stick with me, I'm getting to the Forum. Well, titles of talks can be like that, capturing your attention with a hint or two but giving nothing away, just like the **Forum talk on Tuesday 9th April** when Peter Roberts will be telling us about "**Birds and the Lancaster Pilot**". Like Whistler's painting you'll have to come along and find out what the real significance of that title is.

Who comes to mind when you hear the name "Maggie"? Could be my cousin Margaret, but I wouldn't call her that if I were you - that would get you a smart clump round the ear! Then there's that politician from Grantham - yes, that's the one, had a big handbag and a husband called Dennis. But at the Forum we're thinking of a different Maggie altogether, Maggie Keswick Jencks. She it was who started what are now known as "Maggie's Centres" to help people whose lives have been disrupted by cancer. So on **Tuesday 23rd April** we shall be hearing all about "Maggie's Centre".

At our second meeting in February Pam Dainton brought to vivid life the stained glass windows at St Christopher's church in Warden Hill, assisted by Isabel Hitchings with some beautifully detailed pictures. As a result we shall all be looking more carefully at the windows next time we're in the church.

The Forum meets at 2.30pm in the Garden Room at St Andrew's church. Be good to see you there on 9th and/or 23rd April. The Forum outing this year is planned for 11th June, and there's more about that in a separate piece elsewhere in this magazine.

And finally - have you noticed that whenever a speaker says that they go on for another twenty minutes - a last plea for any offers of talks, speakers or other ideas for the Forum from September onwards. And finally finally, - yes really, - that Whistler picture? No, it's not a modern art job with dollops of grey and black paint thrown everywhere, but a straightforward portrait of his mother, more usually known as "Whistler's Mother". Cunning that, eh?

"Jerusalem Joy" is brief retelling of the last days of Jesus, with modern style solos and choruses, rather more oratorio than drama. Consequently the C4 choir were able to concentrate on the singing this time, which they did with considerable gusto. And it was obvious they were having a lot of fun doing it. They had not had much opportunity for rehearsal, but they made up for that with sheer enthusiasm. So it was a slightly less demanding undertaking for them between bigger shows - they start rehearsing for their next one in April. Nonetheless, it was a thoroughly worthwhile and enjoyable show. Allow me though, just this once, to mention two particularly memorable moments of magic, Jesus's grief-stricken solos before and after his crucifixion. Absolute show-stoppers!, and sung in such an emotionally charged way as to reduce some members of the audience to tears. Having said that, they were all good and their next show "Porridge" will undoubtedly be worth seeing and hearing.

Report from West Midlands Synod - 'Learning Faith', 9th March 2013

The opening worship was let by Revd. Neil Eldridge on the theme 'Rhythm of your Soul' using experiences from his sabbatical in 2012, in British Columbia.

Revds Stuart Jennings and Ruth Maxey gave a presentation on the work of **University Chaplains**, who develop spiritual encounters and chaplaincy mission for students of the Universities of Warwick, Coventry and Keele, touching the lives of more than 73,000 students collectively.

Their motto is 'Life affirming, Life shaping, World changing'. Some students returning home cannot always find a church in which to worship, showing the gulf that exists between chaplaincy and pastorate. The URC supports university chaplaincies through Special Category Ministry posts.

Open The Book got a good airing (Julie Jefferies is the national training officer) and we learned that 250,000 children heard weekly Bible stories in 1,473 primary schools up and down the country.

The **Synod Accounts** was presented by synod treasurer, David Black, who highlighted the underlying deficit problem facing this synod. We are basically surviving on the sale of manses and David emphasised the need to prioritize our use of resources to support mission.

Following the abandonment of the Zero Intolerance campaign, the synod continues to endorse the **Radical Welcome** initiative. We were encouraged to support 'Back to Church Sunday' and to focus on how we show welcome. Training days are available and also material to help congregations.

Mission Enabler. A new single-term post was agreed for a Mission Enabler , to be paid for either through Special Category Ministry (centrally paid) or through the synod's Mission Fund. The Mission Enabler would work with local churches to further God's mission in local communities and also train and equip the Area Ministers to fulfil , in due course, the tasks and responsibilities of mission enabling.

Delegates had concerns about creating yet another post when resources are scarce, but the vote was carried.

Deployment issues were discussed in groups, considering how we use our ministerial resources across our mission and our churches. Gloucestershire Area has to reduce stipendiary ministry from 6 to 4 ministers by 2016. We are being encouraged to look at our own resources and train more lay leaders.

St Andrew's Charity for April - Family Space

The modern world seems to have more than its fair share of family breakups. When there are children involved there may well be difficulties in arranging for them to have contact with their parents, and these difficulties are made worse if the relationship between the parents has completely broken down. In such circumstances Family Space can provide a means for children to spend some time with their parents, either separately or as a family.

Family Space is a voluntary organisation run by trained staff and volunteers. In Cheltenham it has established a Child Contact Centre in St Silas church halls in Hesters Way, which is run by four local churches and the YMCA. The Centre runs regular sessions on Saturday afternoons, and makes arrangements for other meetings during the week for individual cases. Different arrangements are made for parents to spend time with the children, taking account of the likelihood of arguments, aggression or other abusive behaviour. Meetings can be "supported", with several families meeting at the same time with staff and volunteers on hand to provide advice and support, or "supervised", with a contact supervisor with the child at all times.

Under "supervised" contact, arrangements can be made so that parents do not have to meet each other if they do not wish to. In addition to the meeting rooms, the Centre has a range of toys, games and craft materials, and refreshments are available from the kitchen and tuck shop.


Thanks to everyone who supported our eco church activity to measure our carbon footprint either by sending in their results or completing the survey after our services on Sunday 17th March. The number of planets needed to support us ranged from 2.00 to 4.14. You can see a graphic illustration of the results on the Eco Church notice board in the church hall. The average for the UK is 3.1 planets.

The WWF survey looks at 4 main areas – Food, Travel, Home and Stuff – so you can see what makes the greatest contribution. Travel was an area which influenced most heavily the score for many of our participants as several people had taken long haul flights in the past year. The lowest so far has been under 2 planets. Some eco-tips you may wish to consider from the WWF site:

- Food plan a weekly food menu and take a shopping list
- Travel Reduce your flying as much as possible. When you must fly use a Gold Standard offset scheme.
- Home Run your washing machine at 40°C or less
- Stuff Avoid over-packaged products

Due to the inclement weather, the meeting on 23rd January was cancelled.

Eastern Promise was the title of our entertainment on January 30th. Ann Blagden introduced us to the intricacies of "belly dancing". Ann then took off her gorgeous black velvet robe, trimmed with gold embroidery, to reveal a spectacular royal blue and gold Egyptian outfit, encrusted with hundreds of gold coloured coins. Originally these were real coins sewn on to keep money safe. Several veils of different colours and materials were passed around and we learnt that veils were an American idea. Ann then entertained us with wonderful music and dances, concluding with a dance depicting an eagle. We all agreed it was a fabulous afternoon.

Bingo was played on the 6th February; it being the first Wednesday of the month

We welcomed Revd Maz Allen and Jeremy Hitchings on the 13th giving us a presentation on their recent expedition to Kenya. This year, 19 people, of different ages and from various parts of the world, travelled to Kenya to take part in the latest Kenya Projects (UK) trip. £26,000-00 was raised to pay for projects in St. Stephen's Children's Home where 90 children are looked after, and Utugi Boys' home where there are 50 boys.

We saw pictures of the local group sorting out piles of clothing, toys etc. in St. Christopher's large hall, so that every traveller would carry the same weight.

Maz has been involved with the Parish Church of St. Stephen's, Embu since the very beginning, ten years ago. We saw pictures of the church, now completed. Another project the team have been involved in was the drilling of a 150-foot deep borehole with two 5000 litres storage tanks, to provide clean water for the local health centre and the community. On 2nd January the Bishop, local preachers and Maz, as honoured guests, gathered to turn on the water and bless the borehole. When the water gushed out, the children were ecstatic, it is the first time they had ever seen clean water!

This will make such a difference to the community. At the health centre, we saw pictures of Maz painting [no health and safety here; she was perched on top of steps balanced on a table]. Five rooms were painted in all by the group, and the archaic plumbing was also sorted out. They also took out some much needed drugs. Before they left a wonderful party was held. 90 children were each given a new pair of shoes and a goody bag. The contents included tooth brushes, tooth paste, pens and pencils, toys etc., the broad grins on their faces said it all. The team then managed to get away on a safari for two days. They stayed at a lodge called The Ark an amazing wooden building, of course shaped like a boat and overlooking a water hole. We saw spectacular pictures of animals visiting the water, colourful flowers, Jeremy's mascot and brilliant sunrises. The afternoon brought back many wonderful memories for me, as Kenya is one of my favourite holiday destinations.
