Dear All,

I have just returned from Ministers' Summer School in Leeds. Apart from the beautiful surroundings of Hinsley Hall gardens, it was also a joy to get together with colleagues from across the Synod (yes I know Leeds isn't in the West Midlands, but our usual retreat house is being refurbished.) I am continually heartened by the fact that the URC is a close family; we are small as a denomination and this has many attractions, not least, a sense of purpose and commitment to which we can all identify.

One of our speakers was Revd. Roberta Rominger who is the General Secretary of the URC. In one session, she and Revd. Martyn Atkins, her equivalent in the Methodist Church, held a dialogue outlining what the two denominations do together at the highest level. In the next session, Roberta spoke of what the URC plans to do on its own. This includes a nation-wide publicity campaign, telling the country who we are and what we stand for. You may think this is contrary to our commitment to work with our ecumenical colleagues, but, in fact, until the URC – and that's you and me – can tell others what the URC is all about, then we cannot enter into meaningful dialogue with other denominations. We would always be the weaker partner, not only in numbers but in ideology.

I must admit, after Roberta's second session, where she left us in suspense, not being allowed to share any details of the publicity campaign (due to be launched in Sept. 2011) we were all fired up and full of hope for the future. Sometimes our churches are so busy working at their own agendas, mission and outreach that we forget to look around us and note that we ARE part of a wider family. Here in Cheltenham, that family consists of three relatives and we should support and celebrate each other's gifts. I give God thanks for you all.

The distribution process starts in early November, so we need to have boxes ready by then. It is not too early to start collecting suitable gifts – toys (tennis balls are good), educational supplies, toothbrush and other hygiene items, gloves, scarfs, etc. All gifts should be new and please note that hand knitted stuffed toys need a CE mark.

This is a great way of helping needy children at Christmas time and I hope we will be able to match last year's support once again.

The church at Warden Hill will also be having a rest from some of its regular activities but some new and different ones will be taking place in these Summer months.

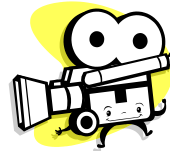

Redevelopment: the next phase

The Elders have agreed that we will formally launch the next phase of our redevelopment appeal once the committee has been formed and had a chance to consider how it wishes to function. However we have been able to agree on a chairman for the appeal: Ian Thomson has agreed to lead it once he returns to Cheltenham in July. We expect to unveil the full committee by the time the September issue goes to press.

The first work required is replacing the hall heating system with something that will remain useable after the rest of the work is completed. It is envisaged that it will be radiators at floor level and, as I write this, we are awaiting quotes and specifications so that we can appoint a contractor and get the work done this summer. It is possible that some of the wood blocks will have to be lifted round the edge to make the layout work.

The next phase is to get a formal specification drawn up for replacing the floor and lighting, then redecorating the hall. The architect has been asked to give us a price and timetable for that. With that we can then go out to tender and have a contractor ready in place for next summer. However, because of possible changes in the VAT rules for listed churches like ours, we may need to have contracts signed and materials on site by the end of March 2011. I hope we can also include work on the skylights within this programme because of the problems with access. As I have explained to several hirers, and found ways of relocating them for the work period, the work window is primarily from mid June to the end of September. The flooring contractor needs virtually all of that time because of the extent of the work and the time required for the floor to settle once installed. The hall would be sealed off and there would be no access to the stores during that period. Particular attention will be paid to avoiding dust getting into the kitchen.

There is more work required after the interior is finished, but apart from installing secondary glazing on the main hall windows the work is external. The current phase of external work is almost complete, but it was held up at the end by the wrong guttering being supplied to the contractor. We do have a fully replaced flat roof over the stores so hopefully there will be no more leaks there.
